Thanks for your continued support. The CMS staff continues to challenge your son/daughter daily whether it be in regular, high ability or special needs classes—all are challenged to do their best. Parents, please continue to check Skyward for updates on how your child is progressing in school. If you have questions, please contact your child's teacher, counselor or administrator. Naturally, your child's teacher should be the primary contact in regard to academic related questions. If a conference is necessary, we can do them in-person or via Google Meet.

A huge "shout out" to all students in regard to their acceptance of ALL kids at CMS. I am proud of their efforts, especially our peer mentors, who work with our students with special needs. The bond that is formed over the year is priceless and the "learning" that occurs provides all students with a different outlook on life, so THANK YOU!

As we move through the year, there are numerous activities that will be taking place at CMS or LCHS. I encourage you to check the school website for detailed information pertaining to events, times and locations. For example, this year the holiday band and choir concerts will be held at LCHS to accommodate the patrons. Our Thanksgiving break will begin on Wednesday, November 23rd and students will return on Monday, November 28th.

Over the past few weeks, the administrative team has been dealing with a lot of cell phone related issues. I ask you, as parents, to please monitor your child and their activities on their cell phones. It seems that Snap Chat, private group chats, and other Apps seem to be causing numerous problems because the children do not realize the ramifications/repercussions of their actions. Any help from you in this area would be appreciated.

Are you interested in a part time job? If so, please fill out an on-line application on the LC website. There are many openings for bus drivers, paraprofessionals, substitute nurses, kitchen help, and daily substitutes. We would love to have you become part of the LC family.

The safety cones in the parking lot are there for several reasons. The main one is student safety. On several occasions recently, several cars have driven right through the cone areas. Our goal for all students is to walk across the parking lot where there is supervision by either Officer Nick Stamate, SRO, or Mr. Graber, principal. If you are picking your child up and want to cross where there is supervision, please do but wait on someone to assist you with crossing. On December 6th, all 5th grade students will be participating in CogAT testing. Students that have already been identified in high ability will not have to complete testing in that area. Depending on how a child scores, the student may be required to do additional testing (IOWA tests) to determine if they qualify for high ability. Once a child qualifies in 5th grade, the student will be able to take high ability classes for their duration of time at CMS. If a student qualifies in math, we also place them in the high ability class for science; if they qualify in ELA, we place them into the Social Studies class as well. If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to contact me. Letters were mailed to all parents in October regarding the upcoming tests. Until next month, stay safe.

### **Personal Safety Presentations**

Per Indiana law, every year schools need to provide a personal safety lesson for students. The goal of this law is to help children better recognize appropriate vs. inappropriate behaviors and use their critical thinking skills to make safe and healthy choices. This year's lesson will go over some of the warning signs for abusive situations, provide information about healthy relationships and personal boundaries, and cover online safety issues middle school students may encounter. 5th and 6th graders will be given a formal presentation by the school counselors outside of the classroom and 7th and 8th graders will be shown an informational video in their Advisory class. A letter will be distributed to parents by the corporation soon providing the dates of these presentations.

### **7th Grade Naviance Career Lesson**

The counselors will be going into the Digital Citizenship classes each semester to provide a career lesson through Naviance. This particular lesson with 7th graders has them looking at how they learn best. Students will be taking a survey and based on their answers to the questions asked, they are given all sorts of information on learning styles that work best for them and recommendations on how to help them study better.

### **Academic Assistance**

The school counselors provide ongoing academic assistance to their students throughout the school year, especially to those that are really struggling. Grades for the 1st nine weeks of the year are now available to be viewed on Skyward. If you feel that your child needs some extra support in academics, please reach out to your child's counselor. We are happy to provide tips and suggestions to students and provide any pertinent resources to parents/guardians that could help facilitate student success in the classroom!

Lake Central High School Field House Open for Walking on Monday and Wednesday evenings.

St John, IN - October 20, 2022

Lake Central School Corporation will permit access to the fieldhouse for walking on Monday and Wednesday evenings from 7:00 - 9:00 PM from November 14, 2022 through March 22, 2023. There will be no walking during winter break (12/26/22 - 1/8/23 resuming on 1/9/23), or on any school holidays.

Also, on November 16 and February 1, there are large athletic events taking place so the parking lots will be busy on those evenings.

Visitors should park in the front of the school near the pool and enter through Door C, turn right, and sign in prior to entering the fieldhouse. Walkers will be asked to sign an injury waiver upon entering the facility for the first time.




# Coding with Mr. Pimentel

# 5<sup>TH</sup> GRADE NATIVE AMERICAN MUSEUM EXHIBITS



### **Middle School Book LOVE**

Unfortunately, I have noticed a rising disinterest in reading for pleasure amongst my middle school students and that even includes my high ability eighth graders. Even though daily independent reading is something I value and allot time for in all three of my ELA blocks, there are still students that choose to fake read during those 15 minutes. Ideally my dream as an educator would be to catch those students reading as much as possible- even “sneak” reading like I did as a child. This negative attitude towards reading truly saddens me to my core. I strive, as a parent of three young children and an educator to our youth, to show the many benefits and true joy of being a life-long reader. I can talk about it all I want, share data and real-life examples of the many benefits of independent reading, but until my students actually connect with “that” book, they will never truly understand. For those students that I do have who are already “those” readers, I want to continue to offer an ever-changing selection of novels in my classroom library for these eager readers to get lost in. My hope is that those that have not found the right book yet will do so with these new selections based on student feedback, research, and professional development workshops I have attended (Donalyn Miller and Penny Kittle).

After a tumultuous past two years with all things COVID, I have seen so much more stress and anxiety with all of my students. To help alleviate some of this stress and anxiety, I plan to use middle school book love as a way for my students to get lost in a book while developing a love and appreciation for the many benefits independent reading has to offer.

### **Student Selections and Further Readings**

Kylene Beers and Robert Probst have argued that students read best when what they read is relevant to them, reflects their experiences, and challenges their comfort zone. I will use the grant funds to build a classroom library that accomplishes these goals. I conferred with students—reluctant readers and bookish boys and girls—to hear what texts hooked them this year.

Their responses reflected a true diversity: many students gravitated to books with parallel worlds and video game themes relevant to them (*Ready Player One*, *Unplugged*), others cherished books with a diverse cast of characters in which they could find reflections of themselves (*The Running Dream*), and others still drifted to classics (*The Hobbit*, *The Mysterious Affair at Styles*). My list is focused on these student choices, plus my own further reading suggestions: books to give to students after reading something in class that piques

their curiosity. To that end I added titles, including more nonfiction titles, that correspond with class readings (*The Curse of the Mummy, The Great Chicago Fire, His Hideous Heart, Allies*). Finally, inspired by students and coworkers, I have added books that connect to TV and film as a way to engage students with their prior interests, especially original literary works that are part of a "shared universe" with movies/TV, but tell a unique story (*Avatar, A Tale Dark and Grimm*).

## How Sick is too Sick?

This information sheet is designed to be used as a general guidance for parents. If parents have medical questions, they are encouraged to consult with a healthcare provider.

Symptom	Send to School	Keep at Home
<b>Fever</b>	During the past 24 hours, the student's temperature has been below 100.4 degrees and no fever-reducing medication has been taken.	During the past 24 hours, the student's temperature has been more than 100.4 degrees.
<b>Diarrhea</b>	During the past 24 hours, no more than one watery stool has occurred.	During the past 24 hours, more than one watery stool has occurred.
<b>Vomiting</b>	During the past 24 hours, no vomiting has occurred.	During the past 24 hours, vomiting has occurred.
<b>Eye Irritation</b>	Eyes may be itchy, but are not red, crusty, or draining.	Eyes are pink, draining, crusty, itching, painful, sensitive to light, or student has vision changes.
<b>Cough/Runny Nose</b>	Slight cough or runny nose, but no fever, and the student is able to cover cough, blow nose, and wash hands.	Symptoms are severe enough that the student is unable to learn. The student has a fever, or is unable to cover cough, blow nose, or wash hands.
<b>Rash</b>	Rash is not draining or spreading. The student does not have a fever, and symptoms of itching are not severe enough to impede learning.	Rash is bothersome and distracting. The student has a fever or severe itching, or rash is spreading or draining.
<b>Asthma</b>	Symptoms are well controlled, and the student knows when to contact a school adult for assistance or the student has an asthma action plan on file at the school and is following the plan.	Symptoms are not well controlled. The student is not able to recognize when he/she needs assistance, and no asthma action plan is on file at the school.
